On Sunday, September 10th we celebrated "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday. For 10 years, the ELCA has lifted up this day of service, saying on its website, "This day is an opportunity to celebrate who we are as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America – one church, freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor. Service activities offer an opportunity for us to explore one of our most basic convictions as Lutherans: that all of life in Jesus Christ – every act of service, in every daily calling, in every corner of life – flows freely from a living, daring confidence in God's grace." This year's day of service was a sort of neighborhood picnic. The people of St. Stephen gathered with 3 other congregations and our unhoused neighbors through Community Outreach, and we had a cookout in the misty rain. There was food in abundance, a rack of warm clothes to give, tents to sit under, and even a ukulele band. I keep thinking of all the senses engaged that day: the smell of the burgers and hot dogs on the grill, voices in conversation, the taste of baked beans and cupcakes, the joy of eating with our neighbors until full, the cold damp air, the music of the strings and voices, and the laughter of little kids. The sounds and sights and smells of community and belonging and people caring for one another.

I've been reminded of all of these senses throughout the month as I enter our church building: the sounds of the quilters, Bible study, and the packing of Lutheran World Relief kits down the hall. The smell of coffee and taste of treats during our Sunday fellowship. The sounds of power tools as our kitchenette and bathrooms are updated for better accessibility and ease of use. The sights and sounds and tastes and smells, and the touch of people using their gifts to celebrate who we are as St. Stephen Lutheran Church, a congregation rooted in community and fueled by grace.

Order of Importance of Memorials and Other Special Offerings

Primary Funds: Current Expense Receipts, Building Improvement/ Maintenance Fund, and Sustainability Trust Fund.

Secondary Funds: Bell Choir Fund, Brick Maintenance (tuck pointing), Choral Fund, ELCA Scholarship Fund, Good Neighbor Fund, Library Fund, Organ Fund, Quilters Memorial Fund, Parish House Alarm, Technology Fund, and WELCA Clean Water Fund.

Other Funds: Confirmation/National Youth Gathering, Faith Enrichment Fund, Major Church Improvement, Missionary Sponsorship, Rooted in Faith (Crossways Capital Improvement) Fund, Seidel/Meyer Scholarship, Seminary Scholarship, and World Hunger.

Around Your Home

Mailbox theft - Especially common after year-end, when such documents are mailed, identity thieves steal preapproved credit card offers, tax information or stock brokerage and bank and credit card statements. In another twist, thieves steal pieces of mail you have left out for the carrier and learn your name, address, account numbers, and even how you sign your checks. They open a new account elsewhere and have statements sent to another address.

Change of address - Thieves take it upon themselves to file a form with the U.S. Post Office, diverting your mail to another location to steal your personal information.

Internal Revenue Service - Someone mails you a bogus IRS form that you are asked to complete and return with your personal information so they can process your refund.

Dumpster divers - Posing as people out for a stroll, thieves rummage through your garbage when it is out for pickup, removing documents with your personal information.

Workers - Domestic help or contractors enter your home with your permission and collect social security numbers and other personal information from documents you have left lying around unsecured.

On the Phone

Charitable appeals - A person calls, claiming to be with a reputable charity, and requests a donation. They ask for your credit card and other personal information.

Refinancing offers - A bank or refinance company calls offering you a great rate. You are asked innocent questions at first, followed by someone asking for your social security number so they can check your credit in order to get the most favorable refinance rate.

Spousal problems - Thieves call during the day, posing as a credit card issuer, to inform you that your husband or wife has a payment that is overdue. Playing on your guilt and embarrassment, they request personal information to resolve the problem.

Tax refunds - You get a call from someone who claims that you are entitled to a significant tax refund — they just need your credit card number to charge the nominal shipping expense and social security number to confirm the amount.

On the Internet

Email phishing - Someone posing as your provider sends you a note offering to upgrade your service. The email has a link to a website that looks identical to the one your provider uses. You are asked to enter your personal information. Thieves then use the data to open new accounts and make purchases.

Hacking around - Identity thieves hack websites containing your personal information or account numbers, such as catalogue companies. They use that information to create new accounts.

Out and About

Skimming - A waiter or other service person at a business where you are making a credit card purchase passes it through a small electronic device that copies the magnetic strip and other details. These are later transferred to a machine that makes a fake card.

Credit checks - Posing as your employer, landlord or someone else with a legitimate reason, identity thieves request firms with your records to supply your social security number or other personal information.

Inside job - A co-worker in human resources or payroll with access to your personal information sells it to identity thieves who use it to create a new you and new accounts in your name at another address.

Shoulder surfers - Thieves watch from a nearby location as you punch your telephone calling card or credit card information into a telephone, computer or ATM machine.

COUNCIL MINUTES ~ SEPTEMBER 12, 2023

The meeting opened at 5:30 pm following the Executive Committee meeting.

A motion was made and passed to accept the August 13, 2023 and the August 22, 2023 Council minutes.

Pastor's Report: Crystal Zernicke has asked for a transfer to another church. A motion was made and approved to accept the transfer.

President's Report: A written report was provided.

Treasurer's Report: A written report was provided. There is a balance of \$3,274 in the General Fund. There was \$32,000 paid for various expenses/billing this month.

A motion was made and carried to accept these reports.

Committee Reports:

Good Stewards: A written report was provided.

Property: No written report provided. The parsonage has been cleaned and the shed has been completed. There are many projects still in process. Slate is missing from the roof. A meeting with scheduled with vendors to obtain estimates. The soda machine in the basement was discussed. The cost to maintain is higher than the revenue it brings. The options were to remove it or raise the cost of soda to \$1 per can. This is a price most machines in the area already receive. The motion to raise the price to \$1 per can was approved. The bathrooms on the main floor are now wheelchair accessible.

Worship: A written report was provided. Sarah Lonsdorf raised the issue of times for the Christmas Eve services. The times will need to coordinate with when an organist is available or we will have to hold the service without organ music. The Council made a motion to have services at 9:00 am and 6:00 pm.

Trust Fund: A written report was provided. Council made a motion to approve the cost of shipping quilts for LWR.

A motion was made and carried to accept these reports.

Old Business:

- Member roster review is on hold until an updated roster is received.
- Collaboration with other local churches is encouraged. Please invite people to attend our Sunday services and other services as they see fit.

New Business:

- A motion was made and carried to approve August bills.
- **Eagle Project** Taea Schiefelbein is working to complete her Eagle Project. Her project is to provide a free pantry, similar to the stands for free books around the Wausau area. This pantry would include food and hygiene products. Anyone is invited to utilize the pantry or to donate items to the pantry at any time. The cost would be \$250 which Taea is seeking from area businesses such as Home Depot to complete building the pantry. What Taea is seeking from the church is a location where she may put the pantry to be accessible to anyone in need. The Council made a motion to approve support to Taea.
- **Parsonage/Church Update** Dick Holster spoke about the condition of the parsonage and the plans going forward. The people interested in renting the parsonage backed out. There is interest in the church managing the air B&B with outside help.
- Little Scholars' owner would like to expand the lease from a 6 year lease to a 15 year lease.

The next Executive Committee meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 17, 2023 at 4:30 pm and the next Council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 17, 2023 at 5:30 pm.
